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Civic Education for High-Need Students

The James Madison Legacy Project Expansion (JMLPE) and Civics Empowers All Students (CEAS) programs are nationwide initiatives of the Center for Civic Education that expand the availability and effectiveness of civics instruction in primary and secondary schools by providing professional development to teachers of high-need students. The goals of the JMLPE and CEAS programs are to improve teachers' civics, social studies, and American government content knowledge and to enhance their classroom pedagogy to increase student attainment of state civics and government standards. As a result of the first James Madison Legacy Project, the civic knowledge and dispositions of students in JMLP teachers' classes increased significantly.* JMLPE and CEAS are supported by Supporting Effective Educator Development grants from the U.S. Department of Education. The Virginia We the People program and associated professional development are coordinated through Virginia Civics.

*A comprehensive, independent evaluation of the first three years of the JMLP (2015-2018) was conducted by the Civic Education Research Lab (CERL) at Georgetown University.

TEACHER OUTCOMES

Over 90 percent of teachers reported that they:

- ✓ Learned a great deal about the philosophical and historical foundations of the American political system, the U.S. Constitution, and modern American government and political institutions.
- ✓ Felt better equipped to teach their students about American government and good citizenship.
- ✓ Learned best practices for civics instruction and gained experience with interactive methods of instruction.

STUDENT OUTCOMES



Of high school students and 76% of middle school students felt they were more prepared to become **involved in their communities**.



76% of high school and 69% of middle school students reported that they **pay more attention** to what's going on in government and politics.



Over 90% of JMLP high school and middle school students believed that turning out to **vote in elections** is an important civic duty.



Middle school students demonstrated a 68% improvement in civic knowledge, and high school students demonstrated a 51% improvement in civic knowledge.
